Presentation at MoodleMoot Canada 2025

This May, I had the privilege of attending and presenting at MoodleMoot Canada 2025, a two-day international conference in Montreal hosted by Catalyst IT Canada. The event brought together educators, developers, administrators, trainers, and industry leaders from around the world to explore how Moodle's latest features are transforming online learning.


My Session: Creating Inclusive Moodle Courses with UDL Principles

My session focused on the intersection of Universal Design for Learning (UDL) and Moodle as a platform for inclusive, accessible course design, emphasizing that accessibility isn't an add-on but foundational to meaningful student participation.

I demonstrated how Moodle's tools—assessments, communication features, collaboration platforms, and accessibility plugins—can be aligned with UDL principles to:

- Provide multiple pathways for student engagement and participation
- · Offer flexibility in how learners access content and demonstrate understanding
- Encourage autonomy, collaboration, and learner connections
- Embed accessibility directly into course design rather than treating it as an afterthought

By combining learning theories and instructional principles with hands-on examples, I demonstrated how course pages can be "humanized," fostering engagement while meeting accessibility standards. The session was interactive, with attendees sharing reflections, posing questions, and connecting ideas to their own teaching practice. Participants left with practical strategies and a UDL-informed approach for creating more inclusive and engaging Moodle courses.

- Employees and Managers may change existing schedules based on the current terms of the agreement.
